SECONDARY CAUSE OR CONTRIBUTING FACTORS:	CONCLUSIONS OF A.I.B. AN INEXPERIENCED STAFF FILOT, ON AN AUTHORIZED NAVIGATION FLIGHT, CRASHE WHEN HE FLEW CONTACT IN HIS ATTEMPT TO RETURN TO BASE THROUGH AN EXTREMELY HEAVY RAIN AND THUNDER STORM. ACCORDING TO THE EVIDENCE, THE WEATHER WHICH DEVELOPED WAS UNPREDICTABLE. THIS WAS ONE OF THREE SIMILAR ACCIDENTS ON THE SAME NIGHT BUT THE OTHER TWO DID NOT RESULT IN FATAL CASUALTIES.
Pilot either attempted to force land or was forced down and crashe owing to extreme atmospheric disturbances whilst flying very low.	•
