TOWN  
COUNCIL  
BRIEFS

On motion of Reeve Clark bylaws  
were given first and second read-  
ing to provide for the installation  
of sanitary sewers and mixed-in-  
place pavements on certain streets.  
The bylaws are being sent on to  
the Municipal Board for approval  
before third reading.

Ald. Currie reported that he had  
received complaints of a smoke  
nuisance from residents in Ward II  
and he sought to introduce a by-  
law which would control this con-  
dition as in other cities and towns.  
Ald. Atkinson asked how such a by-  
law could be enforced and referred  
to the smoke from the CNR in Al-  
landale. On vote in committee of  
the whole, four were in favor of  
Ald. Currie's motion and seven  
against.

Ald. Grant Mayor introduced a  
motion to rescind previous action  
regarding Lakeview Dairy at the  
corner of Poyntz and Dunlop Sts.  
The Council had first ordered that  
the loading dock infringing on  
Poyntz street should be removed  
in five years and the concrete walls  
for a boiler room should be taken  
out in three months. C. D. Ste-  
wart appeared on behalf of Mr. Nor-  
ris and Council then agreed to let  
the foundation remain for five  
years. At Tuesday night's meeting  
a letter was read from Donald E.  
MacLaren on behalf of residents of  
the district and Municipal Act  
statutes were quoted. All council-  
lors voted in favor of giving in-  
structions for the boiler room  
foundation infringing on Town  
property to be removed in three  
months.

Ald. Currie gave notice of a mo-  
tion which would require that  
Council consent first on a motion  
to rescind previous action giving  
notice had been given four weeks  
in advance. This matter will be  
considered by the councillors and  
decided at a future meeting.

Council granted transfer of a bil-  
liard room license from C. B.  
Brown to Russell Landry, formerly  
of Meaford, effective July 30.

Some councillors reported having  
had complaints that night soil has  
not been removed in Barrie for  
several months. The feeling was  
that it was on account of the WPTB  
not permitting a raise in price of  
35c to the workman. About 200  
places are affected. The chairman  
of the Board of Works was asked  
to take some action.

Mayor Sinclair reported that he  
had visited the Town Assessor,  
Wilson Knapp, who is confined to  
his home with illness.

Mayor Sinclair and Ald. Mayor  
reported that an agreement had  
been reached with Walter Sarjeant  
regarding a roadway to be put  
through from Mary Street to High  
street a few hundred feet up from  
the Bay.

A letter was read from Boys and  
Boys regarding a request from Mrs.  
B. W. Smith to erect more cabins  
in Ward I. It was pointed out that  
there is a restrictive bylaw apply-  
ing to this and the Council decided  
to wait until they could hear from  
residents of Ward I before taking  
action.

Cheddar Cheese Again  
Made In Simcoe County

Cheddar cheese was made in Sim-  
coe County in June for the first  
time in about 25 years. However,  
none of this cheese is available for  
local residents as it is all required  
for shipment to Britain.

The Barrie-Allandale Dairy has  
begun a revival of the cheese-mak-  
ing industry which was quite exten-  
sive throughout the County half a  
century ago.

Some 30 or 35 years ago a cheese  
board used to meet in Barrie once a  
month and George C. Brown was  
secretary. This board represented  
12 or 13 cheese makers in the north  
part of Simcoe. However, they gradu-  
ally went out of business until  
every cheese factory in Simcoe was  
shut down.

Among the places in the district  
where there were cheese factories  
around the turn of the century  
were: Crown Hill, Guthrie, Hills-  
dale, Edenvale, Wyvale, Cook-  
town and others.

According to Sheriff F. C. Drury,  
milk for the cheese factories in  
those days was from Shorthorn  
cows. However, on account of the  
price of cheese and the price of  
beef, it became more profitable to  
raise the Shorthorn calves on skim  
milk and use the cream for butter.

This cut off the supply from the  
cheese factories and they were com-  
pelled to close.

In the latter half of last month  
100 boxes of cheese averaging 93  
pounds were shipped from Barrie to  
Toronto for grading and inspection.  
This was the beginning of a busi-  
ness that may reach a volume of  
one ton of cheese every day.

Ninety-five farmers are now sup-  
plying milk to the Barrie-Allandale  
Dairy for the manufacture of  
cheese. It requires about 20,000  
pounds of whole milk for one ton of  
cheese. When the cheese is made  
up into blocks weighing nearly 100  
pounds it is placed in a cold stor-  
age room for 10 days' curing at a

temperature of 50 degrees.

Although the cheese for the Brit-  
ish market is not colored, the sum-  
mer milk makes cheese that has the  
appearance of being colored. Later  
in the year the cheese will be white.

As a by-product of the cheese  
manufacture, whey butter is being  
made. This butter, while it taste  
and looks much the same as ordi-  
nary dairy butter, cannot be sold on  
the regular market. It is only to be  
sold to farmers who supply milk  
for the cheese factory.

Bob Hodges, proprietor of the  
Barrie-Allandale Dairy, made plans  
last year for this addition to his  
business. A new building has been

Milk Board Gives  
Warning on Violations

A survey of conditions in the  
Barrie milk market has just been  
completed. Local fluid milk distri-  
butors have been warned by the  
Milk Control Board of Ontario that  
a serious view will be taken of any  
violations of the Order which re-  
quires householders to leave out an  
empty milk bottle and cash or tick-  
ets for each bottle of milk required.

A spokesman for the local milk  
distributors said that the majority  
of the householders are co-operat-  
ing splendidly with the dairy indus-  
try, but in some cases there were  
evidences of Board Order No. 42-60,  
which has the concurrence of the  
War-time Prices and Trade Board.  
The Order stipulates that a deposit  
of five cents shall be collected by  
every person selling milk or milk  
products in the Province of Ontario  
for each milk bottle delivered to  
any person when another milk  
bottle is not received in exchange.  
The order also provides that milk  
and milk products shall be sold in  
exchange for cash or prepaid milk  
tickets only. This order is effective  
in Barrie July 23.

The local milk distributors feel  
confident that they will have the  
full cooperation of the citizens of  
Barrie in carrying out these regula-  
tions.

erected adjacent to the dairy on  
Sapina street, and it is now ready  
for making cheese at full capacity.  
John Barrington, who made cheese  
in Eastern Ontario and Quebec, has  
been placed in charge of production.

In recent weeks there has been an  
extra demand for milk in the Barrie  
district on account of the heavy  
summer tourist trade. To date, only  
surplus milk has been used for the  
manufacture of cheese. However,  
the plant will soon be making  
cheese daily and the capacity will  
be up to one ton of cheddar cheese  
each day.

Yesterday (July 18) the cheese  
factory had been in operation five  
weeks, during which 300 cheese,  
averaging 93-95 lbs. each, were  
made, thus making 300,000 lbs. of  
milk which was not required for  
Barrie, Camp Borden or tourists.  
At Labor Day, when tourists re-  
turn home, Mr. Hodges expects  
that his plant will be up to full  
production.

In 1939, before war started, about  
60 farmers supplied the four dairies  
in Barrie with milk. At the present  
time there are 250 farmers supply-  
ing milk to Barrie and Camp Bor-  
den. Owing to reduction of per-  
sonnel at the Camp, today's demand  
from this source is only slightly  
more than 50 per cent of what it  
was in 1942-43. With the cheese  
factory taking its surplus milk,  
milk producer has now a con-  
tinuous market and is not sub-  
ject to hold backs or layoffs which  
were always a serious disadvantage  
to the dairy farmers.
