

Fairhurst attacked another 100, and later a further 100. The latter enemy aircraft crashed at (R) 8 2590. P/O. Perkins fired at a 100 at 1/3000' and at a range of 60 yards and one strike on aircrew and engine. P/O. Perkins claimed this as a damaged. P/O. Fellowes also fired but made no claim.	OPREP 208
							Single engined aircraft were noted dispersed on the N. side of the I.G., a burnt out D.C.3 was noted 6 miles E.E. of Harbury I.G.	
							On the return journey S/L. Harbury and P/O. Perkins shot up a German motor bowser and some troops slightly N.E. of Chugia I.G. From this operation P/S. Arkle failed to return. Another aircraft (Sgt. Tuck) was shot up, Cat. II, and made a forced landing at (R) 8 7800. Sgt. Tuck returned to his unit after being picked up by the army. Visibility was good, 7/10 - 10/10 cloud at 10/1000'.



At this point P/Os. 105s made two uninterminated attacks and then made off. Formation then headed for target. Bombs were released across the I.O. Aircraft were noted taking off by dust. M.R. was observed all around the I.O. An engagement ensued after the bombing with approx. 12 No. 105s. P/O. England engaged one enemy aircraft, following it to ground level. He fired all his ammunition without result and then returned to base with his No.2. S/L. Hanbury and P/O. Kent attacked another 105; P/O. Mallows and P/O. Harvey also engaged a 105 which followed them almost to the base I.O. In spite of all these engagements no claims were made. On the return run the following observations were made:- 1 No. 105 with white wings, approx. 16000' 1 No. 105 diving on it's back towards the sea at (n) 5 6747; a Baltimore burning over lake at (n) 5 6820 1½ miles inland and 1 mile W. of a crumpled C.R. 421 over the I.O. at Sir Duran a Kittyhawk spinning down; on the outward trip black smoke coming from the nose of approx. (n) 5 7010. Visibility was good, 2/10 cloud at 20000'.	SPWPP 141
