			End. January 1943. On this occasion "B" party started to make the new aerodrome.	
8.1.43.			R.80104 F/Sgt. Arklie H. was flying with the Squadron on a sweep over Churppia Landing Ground. During the sweep our aircraft were jumped by 15 or more ME.109s, during this engagement two ME.109s were destroyed and one damaged. F/Sgt. Arklie failed to return from this operation and was last seen at pin point S.4010. nothing has been heard of him since.	
4.1.43.			"B" party left Hamriat No.1 and proceeded to Hamriat No. 3 six miles away where once again a new aerodrome was made. U.S.A.A.F. Squadrons took over Hamriat No. 2. Enemy aircraft came over but did not attack this Squadron's camp.	
12.1.43.			"A" Party joined "B" Party at Hamriat No. 3 and on the following day "A" party moved once again and proceeded to Bir Dufan; this journey took six days. On this occasion "A" party followed the Army very closely.	
			On the 2nd. of January Sgt. Tuck E.D. (R.95818) was on a sweep over Churppia Landing Ground with the Squadron, he was jumped by ME.109s and shot down. Sgt. Tuck was reported missing on that date but he returned to the Squadron slightly wounded three days later.	
			P/O. J.H.R. Thornhill took off with the Squadron on a sweep. When returning from this operation our aircraft were attacked by 4 ME.109s approximately West of Hamriat No. 3. One of the ME.109s attacked P/O. Thornhill from port quarter and shot up the tail of his aircraft.

19.1.43.			On this date the Flying party flew from Sedada to R.8048 ¹ (a landing ground near to Bir Dufan.)	
20.1.43.			"B" Party reached Bir Dufan. On this occasion the aerodrome was self made, it was extremely flat and the shrubs were only small. "A" party was already at this Landing Ground.	
22.1.43.			On this date when operating from Bir Dufan, Squadron Leader O.V. Hanbury D.F.C took off at 06.00 hours in the moonlight and led three other aircraft on a recce-strafing sweep over the island of Djerba to 18 miles N.W. of Gabes, then southwards over Gizrel, Gabes Landing Ground, Medenine South Landing Ground, where aircraft were strafed on the ground despite intense fire from about 20 guns.	
25.1.43.			NZ.419880 Sgt. Cundy M.F. was flying with the Squadron on a strafing and bombing operation of Motor Transport 12 miles West of Zuara. During this operation Sgt. Cundy's aircraft received a burst of light A.A. from the enemy causing damage to tail unit and rendering the hydraulic system useless.	
			"A" party left for Castel Benito and "B" party followed the next day, both parties passed through Ben Ulid and Tahuan and arrived at Castel Benito on 25th. January 1943.

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
